From Conductor Marcus Neiman - I have been asked many times, 'how do you approach conducting the ensemble?' To my fortune, I have been so very lucky to have had the opportunity to conduct mature and very talented adult bands. To my great interest, and enjoyment, composer Brian Balmages, in a FaceBook post, really tells it all. His comments reflect my experiences with my conducting teachers Dr. William D. Revelli and Dr. Elizabeth Green at the University of Michigan years ago. I continue to work on those points the Brian has mentioned every time a practice my conducting (which is almost daily). Enjoy!

Know. Your. Scores. Know EXACTLY what you want to hear. Know HOW you want to hear it. Know how to start rehearsing when virtually no one in the ensemble makes a mistake.

A few years ago I had the privilege of conducting the <u>The United States Air Force Band</u> while serving as one of the mentor composers with the NBA Young Composers Project. This week I have the honor of guest conducting <u>"The President's Own" United States Marine Band</u> during their performance at my first ever <u>American Bandmasters Association</u> convention. A few takeaways from these experiences that apply to every single conducting gig for anyone ever, but are even further enhanced with musicians of this caliber...

1. Know Your Score! This doesn't mean circle and mark every instrument entrance and time signature. In fact, I almost never mark any of this in my scores. I expect myself to know all of that intuitively by the time I get on the podium (whether my piece or not). I will only mark something if I make a mistake in

rehearsal or something catches me off guard. Sometimes, I will even erase earlier marks once I've internalized them.

2. Be able to show EXACTLY what you want to hear. These ensembles in particular are like driving a Ferrari. If you barely touch the pedal, it's going to GO. But at the same time, the most subtle movements with the steering wheel can completely derail everything, so know how to drive before you get into the car. And understand how subtle movements can positively or negatively affect the experience.

3. Admit when you do something that doesn't work for the ensemble. At one point, I switched to conducting in one instead of in three. Almost immediately, I noticed the ensemble didn't lock in and also lost some energy. I stopped, told them "you clearly did not like that!" - we all laughed, I went back, made a change, and they played it perfectly.

4. BE. THE. MUSIC. Even these military bands, which are among the best in the world, sound completely different with different conductors in front of them without any rehearsal at all. If you are not aware of how you want something phrased, how "forte" a forte dynamic gets, or a million other things, then the band won't give you much of that at all. Granted, they will play musically individually and still sound incredible, but the entire ensemble affect will not be there, and it is only because the ensemble is reflecting who we are on the podium.

5. Engage with the ensemble, not with your score. Almost every ensemble I have ever worked with is completely invested in bringing the conductor's vision to life. If you give them something to latch on to, they absolutely will. And on the contrary, if you give them very little, they will stop engaging with you because there really is no point.

6. Humanity may be the single greatest element we can bring to the podium. That, combined with the necessary technique to communicate that humanity, forges incredible relationships, even when you barely know the musicians you have the pleasure of performing with in concert.

7. Conducting is a privilege. It is a huge responsibility and we owe it to the musicians, the composers, and the audiences to treat it as such. I always say that a composer without an ensemble has no voice. But the same is true for conductors. You can be the most amazing, technical, passionate conductor... but without an ensemble, it doesn't matter. Since I stepped down from teaching at a university, I no longer have a group I conduct regularly. That has made me appreciate every single opportunity I get on a podium. The day I lose that will be the day I stop.

We are all looking forward to the 2024 spring and summer season. This year's ensemble should be one of the best we have had in some time!

We are now in our second season at our new home (Western Reserve Masonic Community in the Community Center, 4931 Nettleton Rd, Medina). Additionally, we are excited to tell you that the Community Center will also be the rain site for the 2024 Medina Public Square Gazebo concerts. Stay tuned for more information on our website.

Our ensemble membership continues to grow, and we partnered with the St. Ambrose Adult Choir (9-11 Concert -September 11th) and the St. Francis Xavier Adult Choir (Veterans Day Concert - November 6th) during our winter season concerts. We will partner with the Medina Chorus (formerly Medina County Choir) during this upcoming summer (July 19th). We are excited to announce a new partnership with the Brass Band of the Western Reserve (June 21st).

Our first concert date will be Friday, June 7th and will continue every Friday through July 26th, with the exception of July 5th. There will be a special concert on Thursday, July 4th. All concerts will begin at 8:30p and last approximately 60 to 70 minutes.

The 2024 season will be Conductor Marcus Neiman's 52nd conducting the ensemble. Neiman will be assisted by Dr. Darren LeBeau, Matthew Hastings, and Amy Muhl, as well as various soloists and ensembles.

Our spring fundraising campaign seeks your support for our ongoing yearly expenses, including printing programs, purchasing new music and equipment, and staff salaries. What makes this year's plea so much more important is the increased cost of programs and sound production for concerts. We are in the process of migrating some of the weekly concert program material to our website to decrease the size of the program; however, costs of sound reproduction are probably going to exceed three times the amount of past years. We continue to desperately need your help to meet this need.

We are calling upon you to renew your annual support of The Medina Community Band by making a fully tax-deductible contribution. 

Brian Monroe, guest conductor, has been a music educator for over 34 years, teaching concert band, jazz ensemble, marching band, and music theory/history from fifth grade through high school. His bands were honored to perform at numerous universities, multiple times at the Ohio Music Education Association Professional Development Convention, The Ohio Band Directors Hall of Fame, and the American School Band Directors Conference. He is an active clinician and adjudicator. Brian Monroe holds degrees from Kent State University (Ohio), where he studied music education, percussion with Michael Burritt, and composition. His teachers include Thomas Janson,

Walter Watson, & J. Rex Mitchell. His arrangements and compositions have been published by Ludwig/Masters/Keiser Music Publisher, C Alan Music Publisher, Per-Mus, and online at Sheet Music Plus/Sheet Music Direct. He is a member of the National Association for Music Education, the Ohio Music Education Association, the Percussive Arts Society, and the American School Band Directors Association. Marcus L. Neiman has been conductor of Medina Community Band since the Fall of 1972 and has served as conductor of the ensemble longer than any previous conductor in the ensemble's history. He attended the Akron Public Schools, received his Bachelor of Science in music education degree from The University of Akron, master of music in music education degree from The University of Michigan, postgraduate hours at The Kent State University, and The University of Akron. Neiman studied conducting with Richard Jackoboice, William D. Revelli, and Elizabeth Green.

Neiman retired from posts held with the Medina County Schools Educational Service Center in 2010 (1980 through 2000 as fine arts consultant and 2000 through 2010 as

director of fine arts tours and festivals). He was formerly director of bands at Medina High School (1972 through 1980). Neiman was a part-time lecturer for the music department at Case Western Reserve University (April 2004 through May of 2010). From 2010 through July of 2016, Neiman was an assistant professor of music education at the Hugh A. Glauser School of Music at Kent State University.

Neiman was a founding trustee and past president of both the Medina County Arts Council and Medina County Performing Arts Foundation. He served as music director for productions by both Medina County Show Biz Company and Brunswick Entertainment Company and served as a committee member on the City of Medina Uptown Park Committee and Arts Under the Stars committee. He was a member of the class of '94 Leadership Medina County and was awarded the **Leadership Medina County "Excellence in Education Leadership"** in June of 2014, the sixth recipient of the award in Leadership Medina County's history and the only recipient not a superintendent of a school district.

Neiman has served Ohio Music Education Association (OMEA) as a member of the adjudicated events flute solo and ensemble required list selection committee, communications, governmental relations, music in our schools, and public relations committees, district president, vice-president, state chair for *Music In Our Schools* and public relations, state editor of their professional journal *TRIAD*, and state chair for their council of supervisors. He was elected by OMEAs membership to serve as state president from July 1, 1998, through June 30, 2000, and is currently OMEAs state historian. He was awarded OMEAs highest honor, the **"Distinguished Service Award"** on January 29 2010 at the Professional Development Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Neiman's goal has always been to preserve the presence and character of the traditional "town-band." In addition, Neiman has encouraged composers to write for the band. Over the years, the band has commissioned works by Douglas Court, Robert Feldbush, Stuart Ling, Edmund J. Siennicki, Tadd Russo, and David Shaffer. Neiman is a member of numerous professional organizations including the National Association for Music Education and Ohio Music Education Association, Neiman is a member of Kappa Kappa Psi (University of Michigan Nu chapter, and honorary Beta Pi at Kent State University). He is also a member of Omicron Delta Kappa (national leadership society – The University of Akron - Theta Circle). He and his wife Mary Ann, who is a professional clarinetist, reside in Medina with Ludwig – the cat. (23 12 04)

Dr. Darren LeBeau, associate conductor, started his teaching career in 1989, prior to accepting the Director of Bands position at Revere Local Schools in 1998. Dr. LeBeau's primary responsibilities included Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Jazz Band, Pep Band, and the Marching Minutemen. He also taught beginning instrumental music at Bath Elementary School. In addition to his teaching duties, Darren LeBeau was the Auditorium Manager and High School Building Use coordinator. Preceding to his tenure at Revere, he was the assistant band director at Barberton City Schools, Claymont City Schools, and Tuscarawas Central Catholic High School. Dr. LeBeau earned both his master's degree '98 and Bachelor's degree '89 in Music Education from The University in 2020. He is actively involved in the Ohio Music Education



Association and has participated in the OMEA Leadership Academy. He is an active OMEA Adjudicator for Marching Band, Solo and Ensemble and Large Group Adjudicated events. He has also served OMEA as a host for High School Large Group and Marching Band adjudicated events. Dr. LeBeau has been a member of the Brass Band of the Western Reserve. Dr. LeBeau was awarded PTSA "Teacher of the Year" for Revere Local Schools in 2022 and "Who's Who in America" 1991, '92 and '93. His ensembles have received OMEA superior ratings at the local and state levels at marching band and concert band adjudicated events. He retired from Revere Local Schools after 34 years of teaching in June of 2023. His professional memberships include the Revere Education Association, Ohio Education Association, National Education Association, Ohio Music Educators National Conference, Kappa Kappa Psi, and American School Band Director Association. Darren was appointed as an associate conductor in the Spring of 2023. (23 11 02)



Matthew Hastings, assistant conductor, has been employed with the Wadsworth City Schools since 2015. At Wadsworth, Hastings oversees the 5th and 6th grade band programs, teaches tuba/baritone sectionals at band camp, and serves as theatre manager for Wadsworth's OJ Work Auditorium. As a performer, he has played tuba with the Medina Community Band since 2018 and has served as an assistant conductor since 2019. Hastings also performs with the Northeast Ohio Tuba-Euphonium Ensemble (NOTE) and has played his tuba in various venues around Medina.

Hastings earned a Bachelor of Music in Music Education from Ohio Northern University in 2015 and is currently completing coursework in a Master of Music in Music Education from Kent State University. He resides in Medina with his wife Lindsay, and their dog, O'Malley. (23 12 12)

Amy Muhl, assistant conductor, has been a member of Medina Community Band since 1998 and appointed as an assistant conductor in 2022. Originally from Lyme, Connecticut, moved to Ohio to study music education at Oberlin Conservatory in 1991. She graduated in 1995 and taught orchestra for two years in the Willard City Schools. Amy received her Master of Music Education from Kent State University on a scholarship, in 1998. She then taught instrumental music at Buckeye High School, in Medina (OH) and in the fall of 1999, became the elementary band teacher for Buckeye Local Schools. In the fall of 2001, she began teaching elementary instrumental music at Central Intermediate School in the Wadsworth City Schools. After raising Eva and Simon for 5



years, Amy returned to Wadsworth Schools teaching general music at Valley View Elementary and is now back at Central Intermediate School teaching general music and choir. Amy also plays flute/piccolo and piano, in addition to being a member of Medina Community Band and Sounds of Sousa Band. She is also Vice President of the Medina Community Band Association. Amy resides in Wadsworth with her husband Frank, and three children Kenneth, Eva and Simon.

Banding together to celebrate a new land. The Medina Community Band traces its beginnings back to 1859, when a group of local wind and percussion players got together (some with formal training - others without) to perform music for the community. That first "community band" was called *The Medina Silver Cornet Band*, probably since the instruments the musicians used were primarily "silver lacquer coated" cornets or percussion. Since it's beginning in 1859, that the band has been in existence, there have been 20 directors. **Marcus Neiman** has served as conductor since 1972 with **Dr. Darren LeBeau** as associate conductor (since 2023), **Matthew Hastings** as assistant conductor (since 2019), and **Amy Muhl**, as assistant conductor (since 2022)

Early versions of the band probably existed at the pleasure of the square's business community, who often funded the season and encouraged patrons to attend the concerts. The performance night has changed over the years, in most cases at the urging of the business community, and season concerts have been given on Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings. Since the 1970s, the band has been supported by donations from the general public and, to this day, is supported through these donations. Band members donate their time and talent to rehearsing and performing for the community as members of the ensemble.

Since the 1970s, Medina Community Band has traveled outside Medina to perform: Ashland Brookside Bandstand (1980, 81, 93); Bay Village (Connections Series 1990, 91, 92); Canton (kent State Stark Community Band Exchange Concerts 1995, 96, 98, 99); Case Western Reserve University (Cleveland Youth Winds Exchange concerts – Severance Hall – 2002 and 07, Medina, 2005); Cleveland State University (2010, 13); Dalton (Wayne County Schools Honors Bands 1983); Mentor (Lakeland Civic Band Festival 1985 and 1990); Mercer (PA) (with Mercer Community Band, 2009); Milan (EHOVE Career Center, 1993-2007); and, Wadsworth (Wadsworth Community Band Festival 2007). In February of 2015, Medina Community Band was selected by blind audition to perform at the Ohio Music Education Association Professional Development Conference in Cleveland.

Regional and nationally known conductors have appeared with Medina Community Band.
